

There are lots and lots of traffic laws. People have to study these laws and pass a test and get a license, but even those who have never taken the test understand the basic rules. For example, everyone knows to stop for a red light. Not stopping could get you killed.

God gave His people many commandments, including some very important ones. We can think of these key commandments as a constitution or the basic laws of God and His Kingdom. Today, we're going to talk about the first commandment. Here it is:

> I am the LORD your God... You shall have no other gods before me. (Exodus 20:2-3)

Why did God give people this commandment? It is because He is the only God and there are no others. Even if people worship someone or something else as god, it doesn't make that god real. Let me explain. You have a mom and a dad. Maybe you only have one parent, a mom or a dad. Anyway, your mom loves you very much. She gave birth to you. You're her son or daughter. Let's say for some strange reason you said, "I would like the next door neighbor to be my mom." Imagine how much that would hurt your mom.

Here is another example. It's the first day of school. You come a little early because you're so excited to see your best friend. You haven't seen him for a long time, since he spent the entire summer visiting relatives in another state. As you're about to walk into the classroom you hear your name and know someone is talking about you. (Now you're not trying to eavesdrop; you just happen to be walking in at that moment.) You recognize the voice that's speaking; it's your friend. He says, "No, Steve and I aren't friends. We just live in the same apartment building." Your stomach feels like it's twisting into a knot. This is your friend who's talking. He went with you to Sunday School and the church youth camp. You thought he would soon accept Jesus into his heart. Now you cringe at the things he's saying. I have one more illustration. Let's say you're in love. You want the person you love to always be with you and to talk with you. Basically, you want to be the most important person in that person's life. That's

normal because God made us this way.

There is only one God. He is the One Who created the world. He sent His only son, Jesus Christ, into this world to that we could have eternal life. 

As he traveled from the seaport into this city, he saw many idols set up alongside the road. Just about every god a person could imagine was there as an idol. Once he got to the city, Paul left the city

wall behind him and walked through the narrow streets and wide city squares toward the center of the city. He came to the Areopagus, which sat on a hill that rose above the rest of the city. The main temple of the Greeks, called the Parthenon, decorated the hilltop. It was dedicated to Athena, the goddess for whom the city was named.

People called Athens the capital of the gods - that's how many gods there were in the city! The idols

representing these gods came from many different countries. The Apostle Paul saw a lot of things during his travels, but never had he seen this much idolatry. He started talking to the people about what they believed. First, he

went to the synagogue and met with the Jews and Greeks who worshipped the true and living God. Since people only gathered at the synagogue on Saturdays, Paul then went on to talk to people about their faith, in the streets and in the city squares. He told these people about the one, true God Who created the world. They didn't know this God or Jesus Christ, who had risen from the dead. While talking to the people, Paul met philosophers who saw themselves as the authority for answering questions about religion in Athens. They invited Paul to come and present his teaching before the influential people of the city.

That's how Paul got to preach at the Areopagus, the meeting place of the Athenian authorities. The people who gathered there often came

to discuss history, philosophy, and religion. This hilltop was where, six hundred years earlier, Epimenides gave the Athenians a very strange suggestion. He said they should build an altar to the unknown god.

"Jesus Christ is my Savior. If only you knew him, Father. Then you wouldn't worship the ancestors." "Enough of this nonsense! Go!"



May is Easter celebrated at different times? (pima, 12 years old, Russia)

Easter celebrates Jesus Christ's resurrection. For Christians, it's a very special and joyful holiday. The Friday before Easter is a time for remembering the death of Jesus Christ – how he was crucified and died for the sins of the whole world. Some people fast on this day, which means they don't eat or drink anything. Instead of focusing on food, they use this time to look closely at their lives and confess their sins. Then, on Sunday, they celebrate the fact that Jesus Christ rose from the dead and is alive!

The early Christians used to celebrate this once a week. Since Christ's death and resurrection occurred around the Jewish holiday of Passover, Christians had a very special celebration once a year during this time. On Passover, Jews remembered how God brought His people out of Egypt. They celebrated Passover on the 14th day of Nissan, which occurred in the spring. The Jewish calendar is a lunar calendar. Since a new month started with each new moon, the 14th day of Nissan wasn't on the same day each year. In time, Christians came to celebrate this holiday on the Sunday that follows the first full moon after the vernal equinox. The vernal equinox is in the spring, on the 20th of March, but the first full moon happens between the 20th of March and the 18th of April. Since the day of the first full moon changes, the date when Easter is celebrated also changes from year to year.

How will the dead come back to life if their bodies have already

The Bible answers this question when the Apostle Paul writes about the resurrection of the dead and says, "But someone will ask, 'How are the dead raised? With what kind of body will they come?' How foolish! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. When you sow, you do not plant the body that will be, but just a seed, perhaps of wheat or of something else. But God gives it a body as he has determined, and to each kind of seed he gives its own body... There are also heavenly bodies and there are earthly bodies; but the splendor of the heavenly bodies is one kind, and the splendor of the earthly bodies is another" (1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 40).

Since nothing is impossible for God, raising a person from the dead is not a problem. Every spring He creates new life out of the seeds that die in the ground. Jesus Himself said, "Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds" (John 12:24).


"Grandma, all this thinking is making me tired!" "Okay, why don't you sit down and rest for a little bit."

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wisest, and He loves us very much. God wants us to love Him and to share His love with others. We need to always think about nice things we can do for God and how we can make Him happy."



In those days, the name Bach had the same meaning as the word "musician" for people in Germany. Members of the Bach family were violinists and organists. They skillfully played flutes and trumpets. Their children were taught music from an early age. Johann Sebastian Bach was born in 1685 in Eisenach, a small town not far from the famous Wartburg Castle, where the great reformer

Martin Luther had worked on translating the Bible into German. This happened 160 years before Johann's birth. Johann's father, a city musician, taught his son to play the violin. The boy also had a good voice and sang in the school choir. His future was certain - of course he would be a musician! Johann became an orphan when he was about ten years old and his older brother, who lived in the city of Ohrdruf, took him in.

Johann and his brother

One bright, clear night a curious moon peeked in through the window as though to see what held the young boy's attention at such a late hour. The

boy knelt beside the windowsill and carefully copied down music notes into a small notebook. Suddenly, the door swung open. The light of a candle lit the room and a loud shout shattered the silence.

"What are you doing here?"

"I... I'm just writing..."

"Who gave you permission to take my music? How did you open this cabinet?"

The older brother was very angry. He snatched his collection of music out of the boy's hands. This music was written by popular artists and he was supposed to guard it carefully. He also took the boy's notebook. Six months of working on that notebook in the middle of the night had hurt Johann's eves, and now he had nothing to show for it.

"Fine, then I'll write my own music!" Johann shouted. "It'll be even better."

"Go to bed!"

In time, the young boy did just what he said he would do.


Creative Works

Johann's relationship with his brother did not improve and, when he was fifteen years old, he moved out on his own. He had already graduated from high school and could have gone to a university, but he needed to earn money and make a living. He moved to the city of Luneburg. In the years that followed, he often moved from one city to another in search of the best place for composing music. Johann directed all of his energy toward music – music and God.

At the height of his creativity, he wrote the St. John Passion, the St. Matthew Passion, and the Mass in B minor. Here, the term "passion" means the suffering and death of Jesus Christ, which was described by apostles like John and Matthew. Mass in B minor also follows a similar theme. These works are performed with soloists, a choir, an orchestra and the organ. In the St. Matthew Passion, the aria called Peter's Denial is especially moving. It follows the apostle Peter as he repents, weeps bitterly, and cries out for mercy after denying Christ three times. The musical phrases seem to sigh as they follow one another, sobbing and lamenting along with Peter. Through the music, listeners experience the emotions of sinners who find hope

pieces.

All of the composer's works combine amazing depth and rich content. Bach wrote pieces of music for the organ and harpsichord, spent a lot of time and energy teaching, took part in city concerts, and created vocal and instrumental music for his family. which was especially musical. He wrote sonatas



a rich, strong voice.

The great composer died in 1750. At the end of his life, Bach said, "All of my music belongs to God and all of my abilities are meant to serve Him.



and suites, concerts and fugues, masses and oratorios, preludes and toccatas, fantasias and improvisations. The musical legacy he left includes over one thousand works!





If you have a little brother or sister, you know what the phrase "first steps" means. The little one's first steps are shaky and unsure, but Dad holds on to her and keeps her from falling. The same was true for Christianity. Around 30 to 33 A.D. the disciples of Jesus Christ started preaching about Jesus in Jerusalem, the capital of Judea. They told others that Jesus is the Messiah, God in the flesh. God gave these Christians the power to heal and perform miracles - that's how He held their hand as they took their very first steps. The miracles also helped them know He was with them.

Within several years, the religious Jews who did not believe in Jesus started stirring up trouble for the Christians. That's when many Christians left Judea and spread to other cities of the great Roman Empire. Of course, the enemies of Christ didn't let that stop them. They tried to get the Christians wherever they were and say bad things about them or even kill them.

For example, one young Pharisee from Jerusalem, named Saul, went to Damascus, the capital of Syria, to find the Christians living there and throw them in prison. He was not far from Damascus when he heard the voice of Jesus saying, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" Saul fell to the ground. The bright light he saw blinded him. The men traveling with Saul led him to Damascus. There, he finally believed, was baptized, and became a fearless preacher of the gospel. He even changed his name and started calling himself Paul, which means small or humble.

In those years, all of the apostles and early followers of Jesus Christ left Jerusalem because of persecution. They spread out and settled in other cities and towns throughout the Roman Empire. All of them had a similar Jewish background so when they came to a new city they looked for other Jews who would help them. When the Jews met together in the synagogue on Saturday, these Christians would tell them about Jesus and use the scriptures to show that He was the Messiah promised by God. Hearing this, some believed and were baptized in Jesus' name, but most of the Jews saw Jesus as a liar and forced the Christians to leave. After that, Christians began telling the local people around them about Jesus Christ.

> In the second half of the first century, Christians understood that they were not a different branch of the Jewish religion but a completely separate movement. They did not have to follow all the Jewish laws and could go directly to God through Jesus Christ. They completely broke away from Judaism and began to build their life on the principles taught by their Teacher. 25

Stories from the History of Christianity

In those days, every city and even every family had its own god. These local people were pagans, but they were very religious. They believed idols could help them, so they prayed and offered sacrifices to the idols. Christians explained that Jesus was the one, true God and many pagans became followers of Christ. This made the Jews who did not believe in Jesus even angrier and they drove the Christians out. As a result. Christians couldn't go to the synagogue and had to meet separately. That's how the first Christian communities started. From the very beginning, these communities were not ruled by the Jewish authorities. The number of local people in these Christian communities kept growing. They got together in the evenings after work, ate together, and met to worship God by praying, singing, and studying the scriptures on the first day of the week. This first day of the week was the day when most people rested in the Roman Empire.

Many Christians felt God's call to go to different cities and tell others about Jesus. That's why Paul, formerly called Saul, traveled a lot and started Christian communities in 50-60 A.D. Most of the people in these new communities had once been pagans. These people were called Gentiles. That's why Paul is known as the apostle to the Gentiles. Soon there were so many Christian communities that he, and the other apostles who had seen and heard Jesus Christ, couldn't visit them all. That's why they started writing letters in which they talked about believing in Jesus Christ and living as a Christian.



WHO AM Hey there! What's up? I know that's not a fancy way of saving "hello," but that's okay because we already know each other! You see, we've been friends for a long time. What, you don't believe me? Just give me a chance to tell you a little more and you'll see what I mean.

Want me to describe myself? That's easy, there are lots of us and we come in many different kinds. What kinds? Well, there are Syrian, Dwarf, and Chinese - just to name a few! Those are just some of my relatives. And me? I'm not any of them, I'm the ordinary kind!

I belong to the rodent family. I have short paws, a short tail, and little ears. My body is almost 15 inches long and that includes my tail. Some of my relatives are even smaller, only 2.5 inches in length. I weigh about 1.3 pounds. When it comes to food, I eat all sorts of things like seeds, fruit, leafy green plants, roots, insects, and even other small rodents. I carry food in my cheek pouches and I'll tell you right now that I can fit a lot in there! Seventy pieces of grain, no problem; they'll fit! I empty these sacs and take the food out by pushing on my cheeks with my front paws. Oh, I forgot to mention that I know how to swim. I fill my cheek pouches with air and they help me float. It's kind of like using an inflatable raft or an inner tube.

I store food for the winter in my burrow. My favorite foods are grains and potatoes. I choose the best seeds, sort them, and store each kind in a different

place. In my burrow you might find up to 44 pounds of grain. Once, when people uncovered the burrow of one of my relatives, they found almost 200 pounds of food stored up for the winter!

I live by myself in a deep maze of burrows. A normal summer burrow has 2 or 3 horizontal tunnels (some might have up to 10 of these tunnels) and one vertical one. We hibernate during the winter, but wake up once the weather starts to get warmer.

We're very brave. Dogs and even people don't scare us. We get up on our hind feet, click our teeth and, if we have to, we bite hard.

I want to tell you a little bit about my Syrian cousin. You know him guite well. In fact, he's not wild at all, but scientists only discovered him in 1839. During an expedition to Syria, the scientist Israel Aharoni found the burrow of this rodent. At the very bottom of the 8-foot deep burrow he discovered a female with 12 of her young. From one male and three females, this scientist got 150 offspring in one year. Today, the hands of children and their parents pet millions of these golden little animals. All of them are the offspring of the three females found by Aharoni!

It's finally time for me to introduce myself, but I know you've already figured out that I'm a hamster (Cricetus cricetus)!
