# The Third Communications

Do you remember when God gave Moses the Ten Commandments? Moses was on Mount Sinai for 40 days and 40 nights. There, he talked with God. God used His own hand to write the most important laws on stone tablets. We call these laws the Ten Commandments. They tell us about God's relationship with people. There on Mount Sinai, God wrote the first commandment, the second, and then the third which says...

You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name. (Exodus 20:7)

What kind of a commandment is this? Why is it important? Do you remember when God called Moses to be the leader of the Israelites? At that time Moses said, "Suppose I go to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' Then what shall I tell them?" God told Moses, "I AM WHO I AM. That is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I AM has sent me to you." When God gave His name, He told Moses "I AM." That's the absolute truth. God is real. All the other so-called "gods" are just idols, but our God is real!

When we refer to someone, we're using the authority of their name. If you have an older brother, kids may think twice before trying to pick on you at recess. If someone does try to start a fight, all you have to do is say, "Watch out or I'll tell my big brother. He knows karate." You can use your brother's name to scare the bullies away. However, you can't solve every single argument by referring to your brother – especially if you're the one who started it. You also shouldn't pick on others or boss them around just because you have an older brother. That would be misusing your brother's name. The third commandment talks about not misusing God's name. That includes the authority of God's name. Of course we're not supposed to say things like "Oh my God" or use God's name as a swearword. We're also not supposed to say, "I swear to God I didn't do it" (especially if you really did and you're lying).


The way we say God's name needs to show that we love and greatly respect Him. In the Bible, that kind of awe and respect is called the fear of God. When we pray, we need to think about the words we're saying and the way we're using God's name. That's how we show respect for God's name.

Imagine you're talking to a friend that you see every day. Let's say her name is Katherine. As you're talking to her you say, "Listen, Kat, let's go outside. How about it, Kat? Say, Kat, have you read this book.

Well Kat?" If you spoke like that all the time, Katherine would probably get annoyed. Wouldn't you get tired of someone using your name like that? God is our friend. He wants us to talk to Him all the time but, as we do, we must not misuse His name by saying words we don't mean or using it as a swearword. God loves us. He wants to hear our prayers and He wants the very best for us. That's why He gave us a very important commandment and said, "You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God."



A new family moved into the house next door. From the day they moved in, the quiet, peaceful neighborhood was no longer very peaceful. The neighbors were loud and they argued a lot.




them to repent. I pray

"That's why I'm asking God to show them mercy," Mother sighed. "I think Marat's parents really are different, but who knows..."



and, instead of cursing the people of Israel, he blessed them.





Why does one team win the soccer game and another team lose? Is it just because one team got lucky and the other team didn't? Yes, chance plays a part, but the team that keeps winning has players who are dedicated to the game and who don't give up. The early church was like that because it had dedicated Christians. They were determined to follow Christ no matter what and they didn't give up. Those early Christians were willing to follow Him to the end, even to their death.

By the II century A.D., Christianity had spread throughout most of the Roman Empire. Little communities of Christians formed in many cities. The good news continued to spread. In those days, Christians didn't have organizations that would send out and support missionaries. Some preachers would travel from place to place, but they usually preached in places that had churches. People believed in Jesus Christ because of the Christians around them. These Christians were ordinary people who shared their faith with their neighbors and the people around them.

Asia Minor (modern day Turkey and Syria) had the most Christians. Spain, Gaul (modern day France), northern Africa, and areas where Germanic tribes lived also had well-known Christian communities. In Carthage, which is modern day Tunisia, a man named Tertullian - one of the most famous Christian writers of those days - wrote as though he was speaking to the emperor and said, "We are but of yesterday, and yet we have filled all the places that belong to you - cities, islands, forts,

towns, exchanges; the military camps themselves,

the market-place... If we alone are your enemies, then you have more enemies than citizens, because all vour citizens have become Christians." Of course Tertullian was exaggerating when he said all the citizens had become Christians. He wanted the emperor to agree to stop persecuting Christians. Some of the emperors did stop the persecution, but others saw how fast Christianity was growing and did their best to stop it.

By the beginning of the III century A.D., the emperor Septimius Severus enforced a strict law saying no one could turn from their pagan beliefs and accept a different god. The punishment for not obeying this law was death. At about this time a widow of a noble in Carthage and a slave accepted Christ as their Savior. The widow's name was Perpetua and the slave's name was Felicitas. They were put in prison and questioned by the authorities. Perpetua's father came to the prison and begged her to say she wasn't a Christian. Perpetua pointed to a nearby pitcher of water and said, "Father, can this thing be anything other than what it really is a pitcher?" "No," her father replied. "And I can't say that I am anything other than what I am - a Christian."

Perpetua's son was still a baby and Felicitas gave birth to a baby girl while in prison. The judge felt sorry for these babies, who would be left without their mothers, and tried to convince the women to deny Christ. However, Perpetua and Felicitas wouldn't do it. On the day of their execution, they Ruins of the Carthage Amphitheatre tors then took their lives.

> Of course not all of the early Christians were ready to die for Christ. For example, in the II century A.D. a Christian from Philadelphia by the name of Quintus saw the wild animals in the arena, got frightened, and agreed to turn away from Christ. He wasn't the only one. However, many Christians were willing to die for what they believed. These people were martyrs. Their lives and deaths affected the people around them in such a way that many became Christians. Julian the Apostate, an emperor of the Roman Empire, believed Christianity spread so quickly because it valued things like charity and honesty. Christians lived a holy life - which Julian described as fanatical – and were completely dedicated to Christ. The people who saw how these Christians lived started to understand that these people really did have God's power. Modern day Christians can learn a lot from these early believers.


